For many years at Harvest we've done something to help others outwith our own congregation. The days of collecting and delivering fruit & vegetables are long gone, for a number of reasons, and we use Harvest



as an opportunity to help people in poor parts of our country or world.

This year, our Harvest theme and appeal is for *Toilet Twinning*. This is a TEAR-Fund initiative which provides sanitation for villages in Africa. It allows us to 'twin' our own toilets with latrines in poor communities, to enable people in the poorest nations to have clean water and a proper toilet, and to learn about hygiene. The charity is supported by Christian and celebrity adventurer Bear Grylls.

Something which we take for granted - a safe, hygienic toilet is unknown to $2\frac{1}{2}$ billion people; that's a third of the world's population! It's staggering to even think about that. The slogan for this is 'flush away poverty'.

Not only are there big health issues involved, but there are also safety concerns, especially for women who can only find somewhere dark or dangerous to go.

There will be more information in church during September, and collecting containers for the appeal will be available. Harvest Sunday is 27th September.

Some of us are fortunate enough to have friends we can turn to in times like this - some of us are not so fortunate! Would you like to pray with others - for others - but simply don't have time to come along to a Prayer Meeting?

We are thinking about setting up a **Text Prayer Circle**. Here's how it would work -

If you are willing to be part of the Text Prayer Circle -

First, let me know that you would like to join with others to pray for others. You would give your mobile phone number to a coordinator (to be decided). You would then receive texts at various times asking you to pray for someone or something and when you read the text you pray about it.

For anyone who would like to make a request for prayer -

You send a text to the coordinator (to be decided) and give your request for prayer. This would be passed on to the people who have promised to pray.

The Text Prayer Circle would be in addition to the regular prayer groups which meet in Abbey New Hall on Sunday mornings in the New Hall at 10am and every Wednesday at 10am in Dirleton Church Hall to pray for others. Please let our Minister know of any prayer needs.

All prayer requests are and will be treated in the strictest confidence.

Income

Offerings -Open plate and 'blue envelopes' continue to decline. This is mostly compensated for by the increase in the value of standing orders.

Bethany Care Shelter

The following is an extract of the thank you email sent to All Care Shelter Team Leaders from the Bethany Care Shelter .

'Following the Thank You Family Ceilidh last week I wanted to take further opportunity to write and say **thank you** again for all that you have done in the 2014/15 Care Shelter. This year was our longest ever season and saw 763 different people using the service. Lives have been saved and people who have all met with love have seen new opportunities of hope. On average we Had 39 people attending each evening. You prepared over 8000 meals over the 24 weeks we were open. Thank you for all that you did.....

The annual report was attached which contains statistics as well as photos, poems and people's stories.

This is a true story from the report

Jay has been using the Care Shelter on and off for weeks. He arrived at the door tired and more sad than usual. Earlier that day he had been picked up by the police who had run a check on him to see if there were any outstanding warrants. Jay is used to the police checking up on him as his life of chaos can lead him into situations he is less than proud of.

Happy Birthday,' the officer had said to him when the information came back over the radio. 'What?' said Jay. 'It's your birthday son,' explained the officer. Jay couldn't believe it, things had been so crazy recently, one day had blurred into the next and he seemed to spend all his energy surviving. The streets had been particularly cold and his health hadn't been thriving in his addiction. But how could he have forgotten his own birthday? Here he was alone, cold, desperate and only aware of his birthday because the police had picked him up. The weight of the circumstance lay heavy on his heart. describe the role played by this Christian organisation in bringing the message to people in many distant lands.

At the turn of the last century the British Navy had a fleet of over 200 fighting ships and, at one time, was the largest naval fleet the world. On Thursday, 11th February Bill Miller will answer the question "Where's our Navy?". This and many other questions will be answered by Bill who has spent many hours researching the Royal Navy.

In the run-up to spring it seems appropriate that the East Lothian countryside ranger, Sam Ranscombe, should talk to us about the beautiful countryside we have in our county. Sam will describe the many interesting walks that are around this part of Scotland. She will illustrate her talk with some of the interesting features in East Lothian.

In June we will have a trip on the Union Canal. This trip will start off with lunch in the Ratho Bridge Inn and after this we will join one of the canal barges. It will take us from Ratho Bridge to the Almondell Aqueduct, over the River Almond, where we can admire the views before returning by barge to the Bridge Inn.

After our winter meetings we sit down to a soup and sandwich lunch which has been prepared by the ladies of the church. At the end of lunch a plate is passed round to enable people to make a contribution towards their lunch. Last year we collected over £400 and this money was donated to the North Berwick Day Centre, Inspire (North Berwick Churches youth group), Christian Aid to be used to helping Christians in Syria, and Leuchie. The ladies who prepare lunch very kindly donate their time and the food.

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<u>REGAL</u>

From talking to members in our community I know how much pleasure people get from the Regal meetings and thereafter enjoying the soup and sandwich lunch. Hence, as no one else has volunteered to organise meetings I felt it would be a great shame if Regal disappeared and, in the circumstances, I have put on my thinking cap and have prepared the syllabus for another year. However, please do not hesitate to come forward if you would like to take over the running of Regal.

Many of us have gardens and during the summer months we see the bees flying about from flower to flower gathering pollen to make honey. Did you know that a bee will visit up to 100 flowers on each of its trips away from the hive - I certainly didn't. This and many other interesting facts will be included in David Torrance's talk on Thursday, 8th October - "Busy bees have GPS and radar"

John Guy and a number of aeroplane enthusiasts have spent many hours building a full scale flying replica of a World War I Sopwith $1\frac{1}{2}$ Strutter, bi-plane. The group are nearing the end of this mammoth task and they hope to fly the plane later this year. On Thursday, 12th November John will tell us about the challenges that faced the group in undertaking this task.

In the run-up to Christmas we try to provide a Christmassy theme to our meeting. This year The Real Eightsome will sing some Christmas songs and melodies. Interlaced between the songs will be some amusing recitations.

2016 starts off with a trip round the world with Peter Kimber. In his capacity as chief executive of Scripture Union, Peter went round the world visiting many countries. In this talk Peter will At the door of the Care Shelter he chatted to a staff member he knew well about what had happened. He just needed to let someone know it was his birthday. The staff followed Jay up into the church hall where the beds were laid out to let the other staff know it was Jay's birthday.

Amazingly, earlier that day, another one of the staff had seen a birthday cake and for some reason had thought to himself', 'I think someone would like a bit of cake'.

The room was full and Jay was just sitting down to a big plate of curry that the volunteers from the church had made for the guests that night, when his ears pricked up to someone starting to sing Happy Birthday. His head turned to see lit candles (the staff had discovered in a kitchen drawer) stuck in a decorated chocolate cake. His jaw fell open as he took in a sharp breath. Quickly everyone in the room realised what was happening and joined in singing and smiling round at each other, some not even sure yet whose birthday it was. The cake was placed before Jay to a round of applause and people calling out Happy Birthday' from all round the room. Jay blew out the candles, looked up and said 'Thank you'. He kept saying thank you over and over as the evening went on. He actually seemed different and wanted to chat to the staff about his future and options for moving on. Even though Jay had forgotten about his own birthday, God hadn't, and God wanted to celebrate with him. He threw a party for Jay in the Care Shelter.

The next morning Jay got back in touch with his mother and she was pleased to welcome him back home... From there he quickly moved himself with his new found motivation in a detox programme in his local hospital before moving into Dochas, where the staff had referred him, to begin the journey of the rest of his life free from drugs.
