

Forthcoming Church Services

On 31st October 1517, Martin Luther nailed a document to the church door in Wittenberg, where he was a priest and Doctor of Theology. These became known as the 95 Theses, and it sparked off the European Reformation.

This Autumn, we'll be looking at a modern version of these, the '95 Missional Theses' which are the marks of the mission of today's church. Don't panic, this is not a series of 95 sermons, nor even a series of very long ones! It's broken into 5 easily digestible parts, and these will be out Sunday themes later in September and into October:

Proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom Teach, baptise & nurture new believers Respond to human need by loving service Transform unjust structures of society Safeguard the integrity of creation

This series of 5 will have an interlude on 1^{st} October for our Harvest service, and 8^{th} October when we have our annual Guild dedication service.

Just before that, we welcome two visiting preachers: Rev Tom Gordon, previously Chaplain at the Marie Curie Hospice, and Rev Christine Clark, previously Minister of Aberlady & Gullane, and now Chaplain at the Borders General Hospital.

And that, friends, takes us into December. The nights are fair drawing in, and it will soon be Chr***mas (don't mention that word yet) even though I already saw cards in shops last month

The well known and local photographer, Ian Goodall, has published a book of old North Berwick postcards. Ian will talk to us on Thursday, 8th February on "From North Berwick with Love" This will be a most interesting talk and will bring back many memories for the older people of North Berwick.

Spring comes around March and it seems very appropriate for Stan da Prato to speak to us on "Biblical Plants and Award Winning Pallets". Every year Stan provides Abbey Church with a most colourful pallet that sits outside the church's front door.

In June we will have our summer outing. The Scottish Parliament seems to be in the news frequently during the year; consequently, it seems appropriate that on Thursday, 14 June 2018 we go into Edinburgh and visit the Scottish Parliament in their chambers.

After our winter meetings we sit down to a soup and sandwich lunch which has been kindly prepared by the ladies of the church. At the end of lunch a plate is passed round to enable people to make a contribution. General

The surplus for the quarter was £25,162 including the receipt of £25,121 in legacies.

Income

Offerings - These are ahead of budget and ahead of the amount received last year.

(Note - If you are tax payer and wish the Abbey to recover the tax paid by yourself please would you pick up a gift-aid form from the office or ask Phil for one.)

Miscellaneous income includes an unexpected donation of £4,000 for Nimbong.

Expenditure

Premises costs are ahead of budget by £973, these costs include energy charges. These charges are based on estimated readings and will be updated later on in the year.

Church Office expenses include substantial photocopier repair costs. A decision will have to be made about a replacement photocopier.

The new building project is proceeding and £3,516 has been spent on architect's fees.

Miscellaneous costs include an amount of £4,000 sent to Kalimpong to help the Nimbong project.

HARVEST APPEAL 2017- COINS FOR COMPASSION

In recent years, the Abbey and Dirleton congregations have collected loose change during the month of September with a view to supporting our harvest appeal. In the past we have sent a cow to Africa, supported gardening projects in North India and helped to rebuild properties destroyed by an earthquake in Nepal.

This year, we have decided to support a Christian charity called Compassion, who say "The first few years of a child's life are vital to their development and through our Child Survival Programme we can reach the most vulnerable children even before they have been born.

In partnership with the local church, we provide antenatal care for vulnerable mothers. Ensure children are vaccinated against deadly diseases and give mothers the skills they need to earn a living.

Together, we give children the very best possible start in life and ensure their mothers are well equipped to care for them.

Everyday a shocking 17,000 children under the age of five die, most from completely preventable causes.

It's heart-breaking that often the simplest of interventions like basic healthcare, hygiene and sanitation, vaccinations, nutritious food and safe water could have prevented these deaths......"

Compassion provide Mentoring, Critical Medical Resources, Baby and Toddler Supplies, Emotional Support, Basic Nutrition and Spiritual Guidance

Using the theme "Coins for Compassion", we hope that our offerings will help to make a real difference to the people supported by the charity. Donations can be Gift Aided which will allow the funds provided to the charity to be boosted by the Government. While any coins (or indeed notes and cheques) are welcomed, this year's harvest services (on Sunday 1 October 2017) take place just a couple of weeks before the old style pound coins cease to be legal tender. What a fantastic opportunity to put these coins to good use!

Pop-Up Music for Nimbong School

During August we had half an hour of music at lunchtime in Abbey. There was a great variety on offer, from jazz piano to solo vocalists. Proceeds from the donations are going to Nimbong School, the 'daughter' school of SUMI School in Kalimpong. Nimbong is a very remote area, and this is the first secondary school to open there.

Many thanks to Pat Coxhead for organising this for the second year in a row, and to all our performers for giving their time and talents.

Heart and Soul Swing Band Service

Once again the Abbey team spirit swung into action with people volunteering to hand out leaflets, steward, count money, digital projection, bring people along and generally spread the good news about the Service. Enough people came along to fill the Church and thoroughly enjoy an evening of praise and fun. The Swing Band were terrific as always and their enthusiasm was infectious. The grand sum of £1,505 was raised on the night for the Church of Scotland HIV Programme. The band are absolutely delighted and said this is the largest amount they have ever raised on one night.
