Worth pondering . . .

Thom Rainer of 'Lifeway' writes:

'We call it the death spiral. There are clear signs evident in many churches on the precipice of closing. If a church has four or more of these signs present, it is likely in deep trouble.

- Attendance is in steady decline. Offerings may decline more slowly as the "remnant" gives more to keep the church going. Few or no conversions.
- The church does not look like its local community. The community knows little or nothing about the church, and vice-versa.
- The congregation is mostly senior adults.
- The focus is on the past, not the future; conversations are about "the good old days."
- Members are more concerned about their own

preferences than reaching people with the gospel.

- The budget is inward-focused. Most funds are to keep the lights on or meet the needs of members, few for ministry and missions.
- There are 'sacred cows'. Members insist on holding tightly to those things God wants us to hold loosely.
- Change is met with resistance. With the choice to change or die, by their actions or lack of actions is the choice to die.

Churches with these signs have three choices:

- 1. They can embark on a process of change and revitalization.
- 2. They can close the doors and re-open with a new name, a new vision, and some new people.
 - 3. The third choice is to do nothing. Of course, that is the choice to die.'

Collection

I received notification from the Church of Scotland that the linked charges of Abbey and Dirleton contributed £92,872 via the collection plate over the last year; with Dirleton's share of that sum amounting to £38,145. This is a significant sum, and thank you all for efforts and your generosity.

The value of your giving is put in proportion by the further information provided that the two parishes between us more than covered the full cost of our ministry: in fact, our joint contribution amounted to twice the 2018 cost of providing a parish minister.

16.5% of the collection contribution is devoted to Mission costs- which include education and outreach, missionary work abroad, and the extensive provision of social care which the Kirk undertakes at home.

The Church of Scotland is Scotland's largest and most active charity. There can be something ostentatious about giving to charity- and Jesus spoke about this, when he talked about the Pharisee who would make a show of his donations, as he would make a show of his prayers and his fasting- the outward show of religious observance, rather than the self-effacing, inward manifestation of charity, which is to say the love that Jesus taught us to show to our neighbour. The sum of our personal giving can seem small- we will always tend

to underplay the value of our own contribution, when set against news of some great and valuable charitable donation by a wealthy individual to some worthy cause. Whatever we have given, we are always conscious that we could have given more; and it perhaps does us no harm to reflect on what our giving has cost us, and compare it with what it will provide for those whom the Kirk uses it to help.

Giving by way of the collection plate is not showy, it is not an ostentatious demonstration of our goodness: but the figure accumulated over the year shows how effective our regular giving is. In particular it shows how small increases, here and there, can mount up. So I would urge us all to think about adding to our collection giving, even a little now and again. Even part of the small change in the pocket or in the tray on the dresser, now and again, over a year, becomes significant. The Kirk will find some good purpose to which to apply that 20p coin found down the back of the sofa. And on Sunday, the elders counting the collection and taking it to the bank are just as happy counting £1.01 as they are counting £1!

Our church bell has been silenced- temporarily. Inspection of the Kirk has revealed that some work needs to be done on it. Over the past couple of years we have got the Sunday School children to ring it, during term time, and I hope the energy which they bring to the job, pulling on the rope with all their weight and enjoying the reciprocal lift as the bell swings back- has not contributed to the problem! Sunday School play-postponed.

On the subject of the Sunday School, much of our work over the last few months has looked at the events immediately following the Resurrection, and the appareance of the Risen Jesus to the disciples on the road to Emmaus, and afterwards. The kids have been preparing a short play on this theme. The final school term is always a very busy one and, with the children having commitments and trips away, so that we had difficulty in bringing them all together to rehearse and perform, we decided to postpone the performance till after the summer.

Flower festival

Everyone who visited the Kirk over the Flower Festival will have appreciated the hard work, imagination and creativity demonstrated by our flower team. Another example of giving- of time and talent- for a good cause: not only beautifying the church, but in tandem with the excellent teas offered at the church hall. also bringing in revenue for the RNLI.

Organ

Our long-serving organist, Mrs. Rena Clapperton, died earlier this year. Her music helped us in worship, and was the backdrop to the significant moments in many lives: weddings, funerals, and Christenings. Many times have people paused on the way out of church on a Sunday to say that they recognised a particular air, or loved to hear the way in which a hymn tune was played.

I am very grateful to all who have stepped in to play for us since Rena retired. The Minister has said that he once, as a trainee, had to lead a congregation as 'precentor', laying out the vocal music line by line, with no accompaniment: and while I am sure he would do brilliantly well, we have not been left without music from one of our keyboards! I have become aware that our Ingram pipe organ is something increasingly rare in church music, certainly in our presbytery. Jim Dickson has been playing regularly for us, and has identified a number of matters with the organ where repairs are desirable (and indeed necessary). We hope to be able to put all these in place soon.

Little Nippers



We had another very successful winter at the Care Shelter; providing 8,260 bed spaces and welcoming 722 individuals over the 28 weeks of service provision. It is such a privilege to be able to show God's love to all these people and to care for them and treat them well. Thank you for being involved in this incredible effort!

Planning has been underway for some time for the next winter season. Thanks to the generosity of one donor we are going to be able to extend the length of the Care Shelter by four weeks in line with the presenting need. So the Care Shelter will open on Monday 24 September 2018 and run for 32 weeks until the night of Sunday 5 May 2019. It's not good that so many people need to stay at the Care Shelter but that is the situation at the moment and we're thankful that we are able to meet that need for an extra four weeks next winter. The donation that allowed this expansion was very much an answer to prayer and we're most grateful to God for His provision.

Thank you once again for your involvement with the Care Shelter - you're contributing to a service that really does change people's lives. To close, here are a few comments that were said by Care Shelter guests this past winter:
