HOW TO DISAGREE WITH YOUR PASTOR

I love pastors. I respect pastors. I honour pastors. Of course, you can certainly find the bad apples in the batch. But this one thing I know: most pastors are godly and honourable leaders. They love their church members. They love their communities. They love their families. They love the God they serve.

Are pastors infallible? Of course not. You know as well as I that no one is perfect. They will make mistakes. They will have a bad day. They will get frustrated.

So (how) should you disagree with them?

Pray first. Okay, this one is obvious. But in the heat

of the moment, this one can be easily forgotten.

Make sure what you have to say is absolutely necessary. If it's just about not getting something your way, just drop it.

Don't begin with, "I love you, but . . . " Most people will only hear everything after the "but."

Don't say, "People are saying . . . " Speak for yourself, not the cowards in anonymity. Any leader should discount or ignore "people are saying" criticisms.

Don't express your disagreement on a Sunday, right before or after the service. In fact, hold off all disagreements. If you wait a day or two, the urgency to criticize may go away.

Make clear you want to hear the other person's perspective. If you have a sincere disagreement, you will want to hear the other side. Listen as much as speak-


ing, if not more.

Be a part of the solution. Criticizing and stating negatives are easy. If you really care about your church, you will be willing to offer a solution.

Pray again. Pray for your pastor. Pray for yourself. Pray for you words to be received well. Pray for your church.

I was in conversation with a pastor called to ministry from the business world. His call was genuine, but he admitted he was a frequent critic of his pastors before he became one. "I often knew a better way, and I wasn't hesitant to let them know," he said. "Now that I am on the other side, I can't believe how insensitive and even ungodly I was. The life of a pastor is so stressful. If I only knew then . . . Indeed!

If anyone is unable to fill a box but would like to help, a small donation towards the cost of delivery to the recipient in Eastern Europe etc, would be appreciated.





Abbey Church (All Funds) Six Months to 30 June 2019

General

The deficit for the half year was £6,666. These costs were financed by using funds received in past years.

The main reason for the 2019 budget deficit of £25,225 is the employment, and costs, of the youth and family workers.

Income

Offerings - In total these are less than both the budget and the amount received last year. The offerings received in the bank by standing order and the 'blue envelope' are less than budget and last year. However, the open plate giving is greater than budget and last year.

(Note - If you are tax payer and wish the Abbey to recover the tax paid by yourself please would you pick up a gift-aid form from the office or ask Phil for one.) Miscellaneous income includes income from the Gospel Choir and Dynamic Kirk.

In the last we quarter recovered tax on a legacy received two years ago.

Expenditure

Pastoral costs include expenditure relating to youth work. More costs will be coming through in the next quarter.

Built in to the budget for premises costs are amounts to cover the maintenance backlog for both the Church and the Manse. It is anticipated that these amounts will be spent as the maintenance programme picks up.

Miscellaneous expenses include the costs of the

Gospel Choir and Dynamic Kirk.


Plus mince pies and cakes and a time to socialise.

Dirleton Kirk

At the meeting of the Kirk Session on 28th August, there was discussion of proposals to seek funding from the Coastal Area Partnership in order to fund certain improvements to the amenity of the village. Derek Carter attended the Kirk Session and addressed the meeting. He has been preparing the approach to the funders, and has drawn up plans relating to a number of aspects of the appearance of the village. These include street lighting, the re-siting items like litter bins and grit bins where they may be thought to detract from the appearance of the village.

The centrepiece of the proposals is the War Memorial green and the preservation of the War Memorial, and these, naturally, relate directly to the Kirk. The War Memorial was designed by the celebrated architect Robert Lorimer. 2020 will mark its centenary. It is proposed that the village works with the War Memorial Trust to fund necessary renovation of to preserve the fabric of the War Memorial. It has become vulnerable to damage from frost and rain; the stonework requires to be repointed to deal with this. The base of the Memorial requires to be preserved.

The proposals view Lorimer's War Memorial as having been sited in a way which would enhance the appearance of the village, intended to be viewed against the background of the Kirk and the group of buildings around it. These involve the replacement of the railings between the entrance to the churchyard and the Church Hall, a review of signage here and in the

village as a whole, resiting of the telephone wire which spans the green, works addressing the problems of drainage at the north end of the War Memorial green, and damage to the grass verges on the green and outside the Church Hall.

The proposals also address parking at and around the Kirk, at the wall on the west side of the green and outside the Session House. These are likely to touch most directly upon the day to day operation of the Kirk, in terms of use by worshippers during the week, by funerals and weddings, by the use of the Kirk for concerts, and the use of the Hall by the playgroup and other bodies within the community. It is therefore important that the Kirk's members and everyone in the village, should consider the proposals and express their views. Can I therefore invite everyone to consider the plans. The Kirk Session agreed that I should receive copies of the plans from Derek, and send them to anyone who may request sight of them. My email address is < keithstewart@icloud.com > Outwith the Kirk Session, there is ongoing discussion of the proposals in the Dirleton Village Association.

Following upon Sea Sunday, the Red Ensign flew from the church tower in honour of the service of the Merchant Navy, marking Merchant Navy day on 3rd September. Our thanks to the Merchant Navy Association for lending us the standard so that we could show publicly our appreciation.

Community Connections

"Some time in our lives, we all have pain, we all have sorrow." It's a line from Bill Withers' 'Lean on Me', perhaps known to you from our own Abbey Gospel Choir concerts. The line resonates for me, and for many friends and the folk I work with.

North Berwick Coastal Community Connections began in April 2019, created and led by the North Berwick Coastal Health and Well Being Association, and funded by the Area Partnership for one year.

Our aim is to tackle social isolation by connecting people (anyone over the age of 18) into community activities (anything from clubs to classes to gentle exercise to sports, etc) that they'd like to take part in, and which may have been 'social prescriptions' from their GP. Referrals come from both health professionals and other members of the community - which can include church members!

It's for absolutely anyone you feel could benefit and who's willing to be put in touch with me. I meet them one to one, either at my Social Prescribing Clinic (the second and fourth Tuesdays of the month, 4-6pm at the Health Centre) or wherever they prefer. We talk over what their story is and what the barrier have been for them at this point in their lives, which might include anything from bereavement to poverty to house move to depression to a recent fall or loss of mobility. Then we try to get around or remove those barriers, and arrange to chum them over the threshold to their

first experience of the activity they'd like to access.

I currently work with up to 15 people from a range of ages and backgrounds. I have also luckily recruited about 25 Community Connectors, who are volunteers willing to help with the chumming and with events we may run. You'd be really welcome to join us.

Abbey Church members and clergy have been extremely supportive and we've been given a free of the Small Hall for Monday afternoons (1-3pm), where we host the Scone Café - Dorothy's scones are naturally a great attraction (open to all, dog friendly, free but donations welcome), but so is the chance to meet some new folk and chat in an unpressurised, welcoming setting. We might play the odd game, have a visiting speaker and explore other ideas over time. It's up to whoever comes along. Drop by and join us, or bring a neighbour you think might enjoy it.

If you're interested in referring someone to me, or would like to become a Community Connector (there is no minimum time commitment), or explore other ideas (do we have the capacity to set up a befriending programme within the congregation?), please get in touch as below, or catch me on a Sunday at church. This is such an exciting project and you could play a vital part - I can't wait to hear from you.
