

The Revd Milton Cashman: an appreciation.

The dearly loved former Minister of Dirleton and Abbey died on 29th October, aged 86.

Born in Ireland and educated at Trinity College, Dublin, his first career was in industry in England, India, then in Galashiels. A call to the Ministry in his 40's led him to train at New College.

In 1985 he came as Minister of Abbey, and in due time also of Dirleton which was in deferred linkage. He ministered here until 1998.

Milton and Margaret were very much a team ministry, which included their preaching, pastoral care and hospitality. The Guild, and overseas mission, were also very close to their hearts.

Milton's great passion was for the gospel, and his life was lived for that. He laid a good foundation for the work which has followed in our parishes, because in St Paul's words 'No-one can lay any foundation other than the one already laid, which is Jesus Christ' (1st Corinthians 3:11).

An uplifting service of thanksgiving for his life was held in Galashiels, attended by a large congregation of people from far and near.

Our thanks for his life and ministry, and our prayers, are with Margaret, their sons and family.



Welcome to Scone Café - Abbey Church's crucial contribution to Community Connections

It all started with Dorothy, as many things do. "I want to help your project," she told me. "I'll make scones and coffee, and you invite people. We'll have it in the small hall."

We started in late summer, on Mondays 1-3pm in the small hall, with the kind agreement and help of David and Paola for our free let. That's an enormous Abbey contribution in kind to North Berwick Coastal Community Connections, the new Area Partnership-funded project tackling social isolation and connecting people into local activities.

Every Monday afternoon, we welcome new folk and regulars, play cards, eat Dorothy's legendary scones and talk about all sorts of things. Last week Eddie played the small pipes for us. This week we made gift soaps for Christmas. In a couple of weeks we're doing Strength and Balance tasters for folk who've had falls and want to regain physical confidence. (These bits are all optional extras - you can stick to the scones if you prefer!)

What's come out of it? With some coaxing and chumming, Scone Folk have now signed up for Golden Zumba classes; enjoyed free pasta and a movie matinee with NB Movies/Stepping Out at the community centre; sung, played or danced about at the Trad Music night downstairs at the Masonic Hall; relished a three-course Intergenerational Meal cooked by kids at the

Youth Project; visited the Teenage Kicks exhibition at the museum (get there before it ends on 24 Nov!); started sampling the Beacon lunch at Blackadder on a Thursday; taken part in our Compassionate Communities meeting and Making Memories workshop; joined a community ceilidh band; accessed the Upswing depression peer support group, the Cancer Support Group, the Stroke Club and other community-based wellbeing initiatives.

Two-thirds of my current 33 'clients' were referred to me by community members, from neighbours to librarians to shopkeepers - the rest by GPs through my Monday morning drop-ins at the Health Centre (10-30-11.30). I meet them to find out what their story is and what they'd like to access. Many start attending Scone Café to rebuild confidence after some years of feeling isolated through illness, loss of mobility, bereavement, family breakup, addiction, house move, poverty, depression and anxiety - among other causes. I always tell them that feeling isolated can happen to any of us - including me. If they are not ready for that and feel unable to come out, we face a more complex challenge. I can clearly see the need for a befriending project in this area.

We're also working on a bid to become one of Scotland's four specially-supported Compassionate Communities, maximising our response to bereavement, grief and terminal illness, under the Health and Well Being Association which manages this project and gained our

funding.

Volunteers like Dorothy (ok, there's nobody like Dorothy!) and Community Connectors willing to chum people into their groups and activities, walk dogs or help us on the Scone Café rota, are crucial to the project's success.

Could you help once a month? Or at holiday times like Christmas, when I need to take a break but many of our folk still need the company?

Current Area Partnership funding ends in April. Want to see it continue to grow? Help us find funding and we promise we will! Talk to me soon if you'd like to get involved in any way - catch me at Abbey services, call, email or just drop in for a scone. You know what Dorothy's scones are like - you won't regret it.

General

The deficit for nine months was £20,007. These costs were financed by using funds received in past years.

Income

Offerings - In total these are less than both the budget and the amount received last year. The offerings received in the bank by standing order and the 'blue envelope' are less than budget and last year. However, the open plate giving is greater than budget and last year.

(Note - If you are tax payer and wish the Abbey to recover the tax paid by yourself please would you pick up a gift-aid form from the office or ask Phil for one.)

Miscellaneous income includes income from the Gospel Choir and Dynamic Kirk.

Shown in legacies is a tax recovery, this legacy was received two years ago.

Expenditure

Pastoral costs include expenditure relating to youth work. More costs will be coming through in the next quarter.

Built in to the budget for premises costs are amounts to cover the maintenance backlog for both the Church and the Manse. It is anticipated that these amounts will be spent as the maintenance programme picks up.

Miscellaneous expenses include the costs of the Gospel Choir and Dynamic Kirk.

Dirleton Kirk Session Clerk

Thanks to those of you who got in touch to express your views in relation to the proposals being made for the War Memorial green and the surrounding environment. These will be given due prominence in the consideration by the Kirk Session of what response to make. Of course, anyone is entitled to comment upon these proposals: and you need not restrict yourselves to communicating via the Kirk Session, in making your thoughts known.

Remembrance Sunday

The village gathered around the War Memorial on Sunday 10th November in order to mark the sacrifice of life made in the first World War and in every conflict since. Bob Kane's address was a poignant reminder that it is not only on the battlefield that war takes lives: many combatants are left with emotional and mental wounds which may never heal, or heal only imperfectly, and such wounds will affect the lives of those around them.

Thanks, Bob, for bringing new light upon our collective act of memory and worship. As always, the use of technology to further devotion carries with it risk: and well done to Bob for first devising the innovation of having the last post played from his car stereo, and then remaining calm, when this was thwarted by his car having gone into 'energy saver' mode, and then sorting the matter out!

Remembrance was marked by the erection of an arch

over the churchyard gate, festooned with poppies. A week before, the Sunday Club had foraged in the wood beside the church, under Jean Waddell's supervision, and along with willow twigs this was used to construct the arch. The poppies were made from red fairy cake cases and wooden lolly sticks. These were made by the Sunday Club and by the schoolchildren at Dirleton Primary. Thanks very much to Mr. Moodie the headteacher and to Pamela Smith for helping with this. Each of he schoolchildren in the school made a poppy, and address labels bearing messages were attached. The older children wrote personal messages of gratitude; the younger ones had written, or had written for them, 'lest we forget'.

Special thanks are also due to Hannah Lawley (the Sunday Club's reigning 'star baker') for devising and producing poppy seed muffins, iced in red to resemble poppies, for distribution among those present; and to Irene Urguhart, for arranging with the North Berwick museum to have a 'memory box' of wartime itens available. We examined the uniforms, the gas mask, the equipment, the photographs and the documents, and



perhaps felt closer to those who experienced world war directly.

I remembered being a boy and standing around our War Memorial: and thought how in those days, very many of those present had fought in one or other of the world wars; all of us younger ones had relatives who had experienced world war directly. Now some of the labels written by the schoolchildren bore expressions like "thanks great great great great grandfather". We will honour the sacrifice of all who fought, if we strive to bring home the nature of war to this generation; and to make the act of remembrance immediate to them.




