Mark 12:28-37

In Jesus' ministry, not all Scribes are shown in a negative light, even though they are often criticised alongside the Pharisees. Here is one Scribe who was enlightened, and a searcher for the truth.

The Scribes were the legal experts in Judaism, the people who knew most about the Old Testament laws. They often debated about which of the commandments was the most important. Not just from the Ten Commandments, but from all the instructions in the Old Testament, and they reckoned there were no less than 613 of these. One Rabbi after Jesus' time even said that you should be able to summarise the commandments in the time you can stand on one leg! Jesus' answer points to the twin rules of loving God and our neighbour. The first of these comes from Deuteronomy 6:4, a passage recited regularly by Jewish people and known by its opening word in Hebrew: the 'Shema' ('listen'!). The other part is from Leviticus 19:18. Who would have thought that a book so full of animal sacrifices would contain a gem like this!

Jesus commends the Scribe as being close to God's kingdom. In other words, loving God and others is the key to that. In one sense, to love God doesn't require us to do anything, yet it actually asks us to do everything. And Jesus brackets both commands together, as if they were just one: loving God and neighbour.

In 1527, Europe was devastated by the Great Plague. Martin Luther wrote a letter to a friend who asked his advice about what Christians should do at that time: should they stay, or flee to save themselves? Amongst his advice, Luther wrote

this: 'We know that helping our neighbours means we're doing deeds that are pleasing to God. In fact, we do God's will and render true and obedient service to Him when we engage in helping our neighbours'.

In our challenging days of the public health crisis, surely we need no other guidance than that.
