Half Hour Prayer Service Dirleton Dear Dirleton & Abbey Friends,

Did you make any resolutions at new year? Here are some questions to ask as we move into a new decade. I hope you find this helpful in 2020.

1. What can you celebrate from 2019?

Most of us don't celebrate enough. Too often, we concentrate on problems or simply just don't take time to reflect on what's gone well.

Make a list of moments and milestones you can celebrate and take some time to thank God.

2. What have you learned in 2019?

Taking time to pause and reflect on what you are learning is a habit that can pay big dividends.

What have you learned about God? Yourself? What have you learned through mistakes? Even failure can be your friend if you learn from it.

3. Who should you thank?

Make a list of people who have helped, blessed, prayed, encouraged, sacrificed, and stood by you.

Write them a thank you note.

4. What's essential in 2020?

What will matter most? What is actually critical? Ask input from God and trusted friends on what is essential. Take time to live these out.

5. What's holding you back?

Hebrews 12:1 says, 'let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles.' It could be your mindset, too small a vision of God, fears, a team that isn't aligned, lack of focus, or not having clear priorities.

Formulate a plan to eliminate it.

6. What will you do to get sharper in 2020?

The growing complexity and speed of change in our world means we need to keep learning, growing and developing ourselves.

What steps can you take to invest in your development? Maybe a mentor, a coach, a course, or a conference?

This last thought is the most important. As always, the best thing you can do in 2020 is to "*fix your eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith*" (Hebrews 12:2).

Abbey Session Clerk Signing Off

On the face of it, compiling the Annual Report does not normally strike me as something which is going to inspire and encourage. But as I started putting together my last Annual Report as Session Clerk, I looked at all the activities which Abbey Church has been involved in over the last year and I felt a great sense that God is working through us here in North Berwick.

The Annual Report gives a wonderful opportunity to see in one place all the things that are happening at Abbey. I'm not going to tell you about them here - I recommend that you read the Annual Report once it's published in March, either by reading a copy at church or by reading it on the website. I hope you are as amazed and uplifted as I am by what we do in various ways to live out the Gospel by worshipping, helping in our community, telling people about Jesus and showing people that Christians care.

I have also been looking back over my last ten years as Session Clerk and what has happened during that time. We now have a Unitary Constitution - it may not mean a lot to you, but we have Committees involving elders and other members of the congregation focussing and making decisions on specific aspects of church life which makes our Kirk Session meetings more effective in concentrating on the most important matters.

We have welcomed 12 new elders to our Kirk Session, bringing new ideas and enthusiasm to our discussions. During the last ten years we have also improved the facilities in our Sanctuary and our Halls to make our worship more flexible and to make our Halls more adaptable so that they can be used by many community groups throughout the year. We have brought our systems up-to-date with new contracts for all our employees, and new job descriptions to make sure that everyone knows what is expected of them and to make sure that we know how to support them.

The Kirk Session decided to take on new employees to work with Families and Young People, sharing Christian values and building faith, and Julie and Hazel introduced many new initiatives such as Dynamic Kirk and Christian activities at the Primary School. We are sorry that Julie has now decided to step down as Families Worker and we are looking at how we continue the church activities that she was working with.

We have undertaken more joint working with other churches in the town, as well as Dirleton Kirk, to be able to offer opportunities for sharing our faith, for example through the Summer Holiday Club and the Law Primary Parents' Room. We have had discussions with them about even more ways we can share our beliefs and values with our community as a united body of Christ's church.

I am so grateful for all the support I have had over the last ten years from all the elders who have been part of the Kirk Session during that time, from the congregation, from all our hard-working staff, and from our Minister, David.

I feel that God still has plans for me, at the school and as an Elder of His church, and I ask for your prayers to support me in whatever that entails. We know that Robert Burgon will be a wonderful Session Clerk, looking after the congregation and the Kirk Session and I look forward to continuing as an Elder on the Kirk Session.

You are welcome to join us at 12 noon in Abbey large hall for these 2 fascinating presentations and a light lunch. We celebrated Advent and Christmas in busy fashion. On Sunday 15th December, we had the kids of the Sunday Club presenting dramatised readings of a Nativity story, presented in the context of Biblical history from the Creation onward. The children entered into the spirit with their customary energy and enthusiasm, and contributed as always to that quickening sense of anticipation which is always a part of Advent, with the weekly lighting of Advent candles marking our progress in the spiritual journey towards the Manger.

The church was decorated beautifully. Thank you to the Flower Team for a marvellous combining of lights and decorations throughout. As an innovation, they gave us a splendid display illustrating the Twelve Days of Christmas, located on the Communion table, worked in lights and decorations placed inside old wine bottles. One of my predecessors as Session Clerk confided in me, at least semi-jokingly, that she was concerned lest the Minister might query the presence of wine bottles on the altar...I suppose, where else but on the communion table would we expect to find wine in church? Anyway, John 2, 1-11.

Our thanks are due once again to the Archerfield estate for its donation of a magnificent Christmas tree, and to Neil and Tracy Walkingshaw for putting it up in the usual place to command the admiration of all.

On Christmas Eve we held the Watchnight Service, as always a jewel of light in the darkness as midnight approaches, and a joyful congregation made up of people from Dirleton and North Berwick, and visitors from far and near (one family from the USA joining us). Lucy Graham sang beautifully, and thanks as well to those whose work in the kitchen cheered everyone who attended, with mince pies and stollen, coffee and mulled wine to put heart into those gathering for worship. It is also good to note that we rang the bell at midnight, as is the tradition, and our thanks are due to Gordon Symon and Richard Allinson for their work last year in arranging the necessary repairs to allow the bell to be sounded again.

Our final collective service of worship for 2019 was held on Sunday 29th December, with the Abbey congregation joining us at Dirleton to bid farewell to the old year, and look forward to the new. During the service prayers were said to re-dedicate the church organ, approaching the end of a refurbishment funded generously and anonymously by a donor. As this process reaches completion, we have heard almost by the week new and thrilling musical effects as the work of renewal expands the range of the instrument. Our thanks are due to David Kirkpatrick for his superintendence of the work, and to Jamie Lightoller who is carrying out the works.





No-one who has been in the church during the week could doubt that these works are significant, with giant pipes dismantled and laid out on the floor, and a ladder extending up into the void above the keyboard.

Immediately after the prayers for rededication, we marked the contribution of another to whom our warmest thanks are due- Jim Dickson, whose lively, thoughtful and scholarly contribution to our music has been inspiring us in worship. The Minister called Jim from his organ stool to present himself before the congregation, when he was arraigned, and 'convicted', on a series of 'charges' specifiying his uplifting effect on the congregation by music and conversation. In light of his youth, Jim's sentence was to hold the post of organist at Dirleton for as long as he should choose. Nan and others of Jim's family were present, and joined us later for an informal lunch in his honour at the Open Arms.

So Christmas passed away, but, as the Minister reminded us, the work of Christmas- love, joy and service - begins anew, as we pass into 2020, in the season of Epiphany. There will be much to do, including progress with necessary work on the church tower. I look forward to working with you all as the year progresses.
