

This important role is a UK Government appointment, and involves advising the Westminster Government on matters of Scots Law as they affect UK Government policy: a tall order in these days of Covid, Brexit, and a change of leadership in the USA, to mention but a few!

His appointment carries with it a Life Peerage as a Baron in the House of Lords, and we're delighted that his title is now Lord Stewart of Dirleton. Our support and prayers are with Keith as he begins this onerous job.

ABBEY KIRK SESSION Robert Burgon, Session Clerk, Abbey Church

In the last Newsletter, I mentioned that as Covid restrictions continued to affect all of our lives we appreciated the exemption which has been granted to places of worship. Since then, churches in Wales and England have been forced to close for a number of weeks and if parts of Scotland move into tier 4 in an attempt to lower the rate of infection, numbers in places of worship in those areas will be limited to 20. We pray for our brothers and sisters affected by these restrictions.

In Abbey Church it has been encouraging to see attendances at our weekly services increase over the last few weeks, although we have not yet quite reached our maximum number of 48. It has been particularly good to welcome back some members for the first time since we reopened in mid-August and we have also been joined by some people who have recently moved to the town. An important milestone was reached on 15 November when our Super Sunday Club met in the large hall while the Sunday service was taking place. Our Young Peoples' Worker, Hazel Gray, has been running the Club online during lockdown and was delighted to be able to meet some of our young people for the first time since lockdown began. It is planned to continue with a blend of online and actual meetings over the coming months.

In spite of the restrictions, the congregation responded very generously to this year's Blythswood Trust shoebox (and bag) appeal and our Remembrance Service on 8 November 2020 saw the laying of poppy wreaths at the two memorials in church commemorate-

ing those who died in the First and Second World Wars. These wreaths have now been placed in the church garden alongside the beautiful poppy pallet garden, posters relating to Armistice and poppy stones painted by the Brownies. A service of Holy Communion has been planned for Sunday 13 December. In place of the service which we would usually hold in early December for the families of those who have been bereaved during the year, a recorded service is being prepared which will be distributed to these families. Although our programme of worship at Christmas this year will not be quite the same as in more normal years, a nice blend of online and actual services has been arranged which we hope will allow many people to join us in the celebration of the season of our Saviour's birth.

A few of the groups which regularly use our hall facilities have been able to meet again recently (although in the case of some physical exercise classes their return was short lived as they had to cease again when East Lothian moved into Tier 3 of the Scottish Government's current arrangements only one week after they recommenced).

The Kirk Session met on 5 October and we were delighted to be joined by Mrs Liz Weir who has agreed to take on the post of Minutes Secretary. My predecessor as Session Clerk, Sally Penman, had undertaken this role on a temporary basis, and I am grateful both to her and to Liz for their support. Having someone to take the minutes of Kirk Session meetings makes my role so much easier.

Our next Kirk Session meeting will take place, again by Zoom, on Monday 7 December 2020 and a report of that will appear in the next Newsletter.

Remembrance Day was marked this year in an informal way- there was no official ceremony at the War Memorial, the church bell was not rung; but in spite of the persisting prohibitions against many of the most familiar and best loved aspects of worship, we managed to contrive to mark the occasion with due solemnity and respect. Bob Kane led us in reflection and prayer, and wreaths were laid; people did gather, appropriately distanced, by the War Memorial; the gate into the churchyard was decorated with poppies, and we thank Pam Smith and Mr. Moodie at the school for organising the children's efforts this year.

The virus situation continues to dictate the manner in which our collective life as a congregation is played out. Many are kept from attending church on Sundays, and during the week, by a proper and serious concern for their own health and that of others; many feel acutely the absence of the ability to meet, whether at church or in our homes, visiting, which the pandemic has caused. Perhaps it is being deprived of the opportunity for fellowship, for sharing, in company, our joys, sorrows and difficulties, which has been the hardest thing of all to bear over the past few months. Let's make a special effort to maintain contact with one another as we move forward through this extraordinary and unprecedented time.

For those who are able to attend Sunday worship, David and Bob have sought to respond to the 'new

normal' with their customary thoughtfulness.

We send our best wishes and prayers to Jim Dickson who was unwell earlier in the month- and we look forward to seeing him and hearing him on the organ whenever he would like. Meanwhile, thanks also to Nancy Hughes and Diana Buchan for playing the organ (and getting used to its newly rediscovered range and power) and for those who have agreed to play in the coming weeks.

And so we approach the first (and hopefully the last) Covid Christmas. This will be Advent under lockdown; we will hearken to the Herald Angels singing in unheralded circumstances. To echo Bob's words from the pulpit on Sunday 22nd November, whatever may be the implications for consumption; for the substance of the 'Christmas adverts' by the big retailers; and, more seriously, for our ability to join together in wonder and adoration as we consider the Word made flesh, Christmas is not being cancelled. It is part of the ongoing intervention of God in our lives, part of the continuing work of salvation. It can no more be 'cancelled', by the restriction on its outward celebration, than it could be cancelled, centuries ago, by misguided men with long faces banning mince pies and football games. I look forward to our participation in that work, in whatever form we can devise, over Advent and beyond.

This year the boxes are being delivered across Eastern Europe and Pakistan. Every gift in every box makes a difference. It can provide practical support but more than this it lets someone know that they have been thought about, that they are valuable and they are loved. This is an amazing gift to give and receive.

During this difficult 'Covid time' we have been able to send 116 filled boxes and bags from Dirleton and Abbey Churches, plus an extra £400 donated by some who were unable to fill a box this year.

A huge thank you for your kindness and generosity. So many people helped in so , many ways but a special thank you to the ladies who made very special draw-string bags when we knew we might not have enough empty boxes this year.

Covid-19 ad the lockdown measures hit in the middle of last year's Care Shelter season bringing extra challenges to the shelter and those we support. To respond to the change of need we extended our open period and provided 24hour support in a local hotel. This meant individuals could isolate safely, access important hygiene facilities, as well as access to food and support. We saw more people move on to better accommodation than ever before. Your generosity helped make this increased level of support possible.

Following on from the success of last year's campaign, the traditional Care Shelter model has been modified into an even more inclusive service with the emphasis on re-accommodation. Running from 5 October 2020 until 2 May 2021 we are taking the very best from what we have learned running the Care Shelter for the last 24 years to provide a 24-hour service and a COVID safe space, operating in the Haymarket Hub Hotel.

The new Rapid Re-accommodation Welcome Centre

ensures that everyone has their own room with ensuite facilities and 24hour access to professional services and tailored support to move rapidly out of the crisis of homelessness.

Abbey Church (All Funds) 9 Months to 30 Sep 2020

General

The deficit for 9 months was £30,570 financed by using funds received in past years. As the Abbey employed a Youth Worker in 2019 a deficit was expected, additionally some stonework and manse repairs were carried out.

With the COVID-19 pandemic income is very much reduced.

It not possible to predict what the effect will be on the Abbey's year-end financial position, but it is difficult to see how the budget deficit will be not be exceeded!

Income

There was no Open Plate income when the Church was closed. Standing Orders have increased substantially though.

(Note - If you are tax payer and wish the Abbey to recover the tax paid by yourself please would you ask for a gift-aid form by phoning the office or ask Phil for one. Alternatively, both the gift-aid and the standing order form are available from the Abbey Church website).

The Halls are currently closed, therefore there will be no Halls income as long as they are not available for let.

Expenditure

The Abbey has claimed furlough income on some staff. The staff, however, are being paid their full salary.

Premises costs include the stonework repairs and the front and back of the Church. Additionally work was carried out at the manse.


Nativity Trail - During December, some paintings will appear around the outside of church buildings in North Berwick. Can you find them all and follow the account of the first Christmas?


