Half Hour Prayer Service Dirleton Dear Dirleton & Abbey Friends,

I wonder if you made any New Year resolutions?

They're usually about ourselves, what we would like to be this year, how to improve our lifestyle in some way. If you did, I wish you well in keeping them.

If you were to make a resolution for our church, I wonder what it would be? The church recently adopted a sort of resolution which describes what it should be like, or what as God's people we should be striving to be. It's a resolution with five points (more than an average sermon!), but it captures what it means for the church to be 'missional'. For the start of this year, we'll be looking at each of these. I've copied them below with a one-word summary of each, which I hope is easy to remember (also a bit like a sermon!).

There will also be some material for reading and study alongside our Sunday services. I hope you can join us in this discovery of what God wants us to be.

Winter Emergency Appeal

Edinburgh Direct Aid is launching an emergency appeal to save the lives of vulnerable refugees living in and around the town of Arsal in Lebanon. The town is situated at 5000ft above sea level and winter temperatures can drop as low as minus 15 degrees. There are appoximately 70,000 refugees living in flimsy tented structures and makeshift shelters. The price of fuel for their small oil stoves has risen by 350% in real terms and can only be bought with dollars. None of the refugees has the \$345 they would need to buy enough to last the winter. We fear that the very young and the very old will die unless money can be found to provide them with fuel.

We are working to alert larger agencies than ours to the impending crisis, but we hope to raise at least \$33,000 to get help to the 1500 Syrian families and 400 Lebanese families living in the highest areas. Please would you consider donating something, however small, to this appeal? It doesn't seem very long since the works on the roof of the Archerfield Aisle were being carried out. At the end of a prolonged period in which the door was locked and that part of the church sheathed in scaffolding, the unusual stone roof was restored. There was the disappointment of the first removal of the scaffolding, when the thought the roof was restored, and then on the very next Sunday we found water coursing down the walls. Swift remedial action followed and the Archerfield Aisle room has been made good, for another four hundred years, we hope.

Now significant repairs will be required on the church tower. We will be meeting with architects in the near future to consider aspects of the works which will be required. Gordon Symon our Fabric Convenor has been corresponding with Historic Scotland, and this has cleared the way for us to make an application to that body for funding in order to carry out the works. All of us will wish to thank Gordon, and all who serve on the Fabric Committee, for their time and energy spent looking after our ground and buildings.

We leave Christmas behind and move into Epiphany, and as we do so I record how beautiful the church looked over the Christmas season. So thanks to all who participated in decorating the church, with flowers and lights, and in particular, thanks to Tracy and Neil Walkingshaw for bringing in and decorating the Christmas tree (and for doing the less happy business of taking it down again).

ABBEY KIRK SESSION

After a year in which we experienced a "stop-start" approach to many aspects of our congregational life, it was so good to be able to meet together for worship during Advent. Our services during December (including those on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day) were well attended and I am sure that the feeling of joy which the Christmas message brings was experienced by many of those who attended. The "scratch" Nativity Play on 19 December, which saw adults and children dressing up and participating wholeheartedly was described as "one of the best ever". Those attending Little Nippers participated in a Christmas Pram Service in mid-December and it was lovely to see the way in which children and adults interacted in this short focus on the message of Christ's birth in a stable. Old Macdonald and his farm even put in an appearance! The children were presented with gifts of books telling the Christmas story.

In the last weeks of the year, it was good to see the return of activities which make such a difference to those who participate- meetings of TAG, our women's' study group, WALT, our Little Nippers group for preschool children and their parents, grandparents and carers, the participation of the choir in leading our worship and even simple things like being able to enjoy fellowship over tea and coffee after our morning services. In pre-Covid times, we might have tended to take things like this for granted but now appreciate just how important they are. Although Omicron saw the temporary closure of several of these activities after Christmas, as I write this at the end of January, there are encouraging signs that it may not be too long before we can recommence the activities that have been paused.

For many years, our offerings at the special Christmas services in both Abbey and Dirleton have been donated to one or more charities. This year's charity, suggested by the World Mission Committee, was the Sophie Hayes Foundation, an organisation that many of us would not have heard of previously. Focussing on the impact of modern slavery on women survivors of this practice, the charity provides coaching and skills development. Above all, it helps to build awareness of this problem which is, sadly, all too prevalent, even in civilised societies. Those attending our Christmas services were clearly touched by the information provided and (including the contributions made for the giant Christmas card in Abbey) donated the magnificent sum of over £1100 to support the work of the Foundation.

THE SOPHIE HAYES FOUNDATION

The Abbey Kirk Session met on 6 December 2021 and reviewed our Vision Statement for the 2020s. Many of the issues which had been set as targets in our original plan had made progress over the year including the development of our work with young people (including the start of the Feast group for teenagers and Muddy Church) and a significant improvement in the flow of information between our church and our partners in Kalimpong. Our Committees are currently reviewing the Vision Statement in the context of the work which the Committees do, and a further discussion will take place at our next meeting. It is also hoped that we will be able to consider the latest information from the Presbytery's Mission and Planning Committee after our meeting with them in October about the future of churches in this area.

Abbey and Dirleton have always been seen as caring congregations and pastoral support has a high priority on our agenda. As with all things, although we believe that we are "good" in this area of work, there is always room for improvement and the models which have been followed for many years may no longer meet today's needs. Our Nurture Committee is currently leading a review of how we might provide effective pastoral support going forward and I would encourage every member of the congregation to respond when asked about how they would like to see pastoral care being provided by their church.

The next meeting of the Abbey Kirk Session will take place on 7 February 2022.
