

Dear Dirleton & Abbey Friends,

On Thursday 28th April, the Presbytery of Lothian met to agree its Presbytery Plan. The proposals in the draft plan, which you know about, were passed despite a spirited speech by Robert Burgon trying to change their mind. This is a very disappointing outcome for us as congregations, and will mean that the following will be implemented when I leave:

Abbey & Dirleton will have a 0.25 allocation ie a 25% ministry. This will be a Locum appointment, and not necessarily an ordained Minister. An Interim Moderator will be appointed, and the congregations will move into 'Guardianship' of the Presbytery.

Although other buildings will be retained meantime, the manse will be sold. This ministry arrangement will be reviewed annually, and is subject to change by the Presbytery at those reviews, by which time we will be in the Presbytery of South East Scotland, which will cover everywhere from Berwick to Musselburgh.

This decision is very disappointing, the process is flawed, pastorally insensitive and short-sighted. A one-quarter appointment cannot hope to cover the 'urgent', never mind the necessary or desirable. We're not concerned so much about buildings as people. We want to grow and move forward, not be caught up in decline and closure.

Church Services over the summer period

Abbey communion is on 12th June.

Over the summer we're looking at passages from Mark's gospel. We can't read all of it in church, so maybe you'd like to read it at home? If you'd like some material to help study it, I can recommend: For introductory study, the booklet by Tracy Cotterell (6 studies, published by IVP for £5), or by Dane Ortlund (12 studies, Crossway, £7) - the material in Ortlund's book is also online at thegospelcoalition.org/course/knowing-bible-mark With more detail, an excellent book is David Hewitt's Discovering Mark's Gospel. Now out of print, it's available second-hand quite cheaply. For more in-depth reading, try Donald English's The Message of Mark (IVP; it's £20 for the paperback, but worth every penny).

'I wanna be a paperback writer' (The Beatles)

Did you know there are some very gifted authors in our congregation?

Earlier this year, Ian Aitken published his second book 'Brave Beyond Their Years'. It follows the exploits of some of the Special Forces in France during

the Second World War. They were the courageous young men and women who had volunteered to work behind the enemy lines in Belgium, Holland but mainly France. Working behind the lines meant the volunteers obviously could not wear uniform; if caught they were considered to be spies and treated more harshly than if they had been prisoners of war.

The other tremendous disadvantage was that they tended to work in very small groups and frequently on their own. The book was inspired by the service of Ian's uncle, who was a pilot flying Halifax and latterly Stirling bombers. His task was to fly the volunteers to their rendezvous in France. Sadly, he died on active service before the war ended. It's a gripping read, and a reminder of what people endured to rid Europe of fascism.

Published last year, 'Our Man on Mars' by Prof Keith Cornwell is the story of the first Chaplain (from North Berwick, see the cover!) in a space colony on the 'red planet'. As a lifelong lover of science fiction, I was warmed by the scientific mind behind the book, and the gentle humour so typical of its author. Science fiction? With so many vacancies in Scotland, who knows? Where's the application form . . ?

Jackie Ley is a prize-winning author, who started her writing career after completing a Masters Degree in Creative Writing at the University of St Andrews. Her books include 'The Angels of the Jardin Massey' a

time-slip story inspired by real public gardens with a beautiful reconstructed 16th century cloister, in Pau, Southern France. The novel's action moves between an American woman and her female British student lodger who live in a flat overlooking the gardens, and a young 16th century

Medieval monk. Their lives interweave with poignant

and often humorous effect.


'Gift of Sparrows' was inspired by the first house she owned in France, an ancient 3 storey Belle Époque house, and their eccentric British next door neighbours who became very unconventional friends. It combines suspense with humour, and has a spiritual undercurrent which is her writing trademark.





'Rescuing Rapunzel' is set in the Stockbridge colonies in Edinburgh, it's a 'domestic noir' novel, and features a little girl who goes missing, and her grandmother's quest to find her: layers of nail -biting suspense with a happy ending.

Published under the name Jacqueline Ley, her first book was 'No Ordinary Child', a reflective and scriptural celebration by a Christian mother of her gay son. Personal and poignant. Published by Wild Goose (Iona Community publishing).



Apart from the last one, all the books are available on Amazon, which also gives 'our' authors very near 5-star reviews. And for about a tenner or less, they're all excellent value. Please keep writing, we want more! Apologies if there are other writers I don't know about: please make yourself known. PS I'm not on commission!

Dirleton Kirk Session Keith Stewart

The Presbytery meeting which took place on 28th April resulted in an unwelcome, if predictable, decision. At such time as David retires, our linked charge of Abbey and Dirleton will move into what is known as 'guardianship', with a locum minister in post only two days a week.

The avowed intention of the Presbytery plan is the creation of 'one vibrant missional church' in towns of over 5,000 inhabitants. That the approach will be to prioritize one such church in North Berwick over another (ourselves), to the detriment of the one not prioritized, has been considered by Presbytery and passed over.

The Presbytery was told of the scale of the pastoral work carried out by our Minister and pastoral assistant, and how difficult it would be to foresee that this vital work could be continued as effectively under the arrangements now contemplated.

Presbytery's decision acknowledges our meeting the criteria selected for this process of determining which churches should be granted the 'most favoured status' of continuing with a full-time Minister. We are not to be thought of as having failed to demonstrate our success in the restricted categories of church activity which were selected as the measures against which the distribution of the resources of Presbytery

is to be allocated. Whether those criteria are sufficient to value the work of churches- whether it is right to elevate them above other considerations, such as witness, and service, will remain a matter of active discussion.

The Kirk Session will consider the outcome of these discussions at its next meeting. For the present, I acknowledge the huge effort made by Robert Burgon, Session Clerk at Abbey, in preparing and leading our response to the Presbytery's proposals.

We have recently lost a number of beloved members of our community. I hope I will be forgiven for writing about just one, Joan Fraser, in this newsletter.

Ian Fraser was the first Minister at Dirleton whom I knew. While the appearance of the village has not changed significantly since we moved here, in many ways it was a very different place. When I was at the Primary School, many of the children came from families employed directly in farming. The parents of practically all the children worked within the immediate area.

Mrs. Fraser was an active, kindly, always approachable woman, who placed herself at the heart of the life of the village and the wider parish. As I grew older I appreciated all the more her intelligence, her insight, and her gently ironical sense of humour. I realised more the extent to which she had cared for Ian, as the progressively crippling rheumatoid arthritis from which he suffered. In the face of that condition, his Ministry to us was heroic, and her part in that Ministry was heroic too.

Abbey Kirk Session Robert Burgon



It was so good to welcome a group of around 40 (of all ages) on Anchor Green at 8.00am for our outdoor Easter Day celebration, followed by breakfast in the Church Hall. We had been unable to meet in this way since Easter 2019 and the weather was as good as I can recall at any of these gatherings in the several decades in which they have taken place. What an encouraging start to our celebration to mark Christ's resurrection!

On a much less positive note, just 4 days later, 12 representatives of Dirleton and Abbey churches sat through the debate at the Presbytery of Lothian's meeting to decide how to allocate the (reduced) number of ministers available in our area in the future. The starting point of this exercise was a policy that each town in the area with a population of over 5,000 should have at least one Minister of Word and Sacrament. In some places, like Haddington, that will mean that at least one church will close. The Presbytery's Strategic Planning and Mission Committee accepted, at an early stage in this process, that there were two towns (Dunbar and North Berwick) in which there were two churches "actively involved in mission, financially viable, with a good number attending worship and an active eldership". It therefore proposed that in those towns (which includes Dirleton), two churches could remain

open, but one of them would have a reduced ministry allocation.

For two years, our two Kirk Sessions have tried, and failed, to convince the Committee that Dirleton and Abbey needed more than one quarter of someone's time to lead our ministry while other congregations in the area, including one in the Dunbar area, were being allocated more. The justification for this difference was that the population of Dunbar is higher than that of North Berwick. We find this hard to accept, given the size and and effectiveness of our two congregations. We do not accept that population numbers should determine future ministry.

We believe that we have a strong case for the continuation of an active ministry in our area and had made a written submission prior to the meeting. Each congregation was each given 4 minutes to state their case, and I tried to do so on behalf of our congregations. A countermotion was made that the Committee reconsidered its proposals for us. The matter went to a vote. The Committee Convenor opposed our countermotion saying that if we were allocated more, another congregation would have their allocation reduced. It wasn't too surprising to find, given that statement, that our countermotion was rejected by other congregations.

It is hard to find words to express the disappointment faced by those of us who went to Haddington that night. Your Kirk Session will meet again on 6 June 2022 and we will consider our next steps at that meeting. However, in the meantime, it has to be stressed that we continue to have two thriving (and growing) fellowships) under the leadership of our Minister, David. What was agreed by Presbytery will not be implemented until David is no longer our Minister and at that time, Dirleton and Abbey will remain open. This process has not been easy for David and his wife, Mary, and I urge all members to continue to pray for them and their ministry amongst us.

In closing, on a more positive, note, it has been good to see all of our church-led activities being so well supported in the past year, in spite of the ongoing challenges of the pandemic. As TAG, WALT, Regal and Little Nippers and their leaders prepare for a well-deserved break over the summer months, we give thanks for their enthusiasm and for the excellent work which they continue to carry out in Christ's name in our community.

General

Payments exceeded receipts by £5,375. This is much better than budget. The budget was set to allow for the employment of a youth worker and many other expenses.
